School Dinners

This is to inform you that all school lunches must now be paid for online. The school will no longer be able to collect cash on a daily basis.

If your child has school dinners, and there is a balance outstanding on your account, we would be grateful if you would kindly clear this balance as soon as possible.

If you have any query or difficulty with payment of this amount, please let us know and we will endeavour to help.

You will need to register online if you have not done so before. A letter with your personal log on details has been sent home with your child. If you have previously logged on to the Tucasi system but have forgotten your password, please follow the instructions on the login screen.

As a reminder:

Primary lunch is £2.53 Secondary lunch is £2.63

Please remember that money for school dinners should be paid <u>in advance</u>.

Please see message below from Wokingham Borough Council about eligibility to claim for free school meals. Even if your child already gets free school meals due to their age (Pupils in Reception, Year 1 and Year 2 now qualify automatically for free school meals), if you qualify for one of the benefits listed below it is important to make an application for free school meals as your child will then qualify for extra funding for their education. More information can be found on the free school meals page on the school website.

Across the UK more than 10 per cent of pupils who are eligible for free school meals do not register to get them.

We want to make sure 100 per cent of our pupils claim when they can in Wokingham Borough. Importantly, it also means schools can get additional funding to support pupils.

To qualify, your child must be in school and you must be receiving one of the following benefits:

- Income support
- Income based <u>Job Seekers Allowance</u>
- Income related <u>Employment and Support Allowance</u>
- NASS support
- Guarantee element of State Pension
- Child Tax Credit, provided you're not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190
- Working Tax Credit for the four weeks after employment ends
- Universal Credit, provided you have an annual net earned income of no more than £7,400


If this applies to you but your child isn't registered for free school meals, complete a form and return it to your child school.

CAR PARKING REMINDER (MAIN SITE)

Please see below our quick guide to parking at the Addington Main Site in Woodley.

Despite all of the measures that the site team and I have put in place to ensure the smooth and safe operation of our car park it continues to be extremely busy at drop off and pick up times. It can become really difficult when the rules on the quick guide are not followed.



If you have a parking permit that allows you to enter our car park, please make sure you follow all directions from the school team and bear with us as the team manage the car park. During busy periods you may be asked to circle the car park a number of times before being able to park.

If you do not have a parking permit please do not enter our main car park for any reason, during drop off and pick up times. Please park offsite and walk in with your child. If you have a specific situation please discuss with a senior leader, do not just turn up as the site team will ask you to leave the site.

The governing body are fully aware of the challenges we are facing with our car park and support us in challenging anyone who should not be driving into our car park, or anyone who is not following the rules below.





Squirrel Class

Squirrel class pupils have had a busy and fun term, becoming more familiar with new routines and events including brushing our teeth daily! The children have enjoyed learning about this



term's topic about *Changes*. They have particularly shown an interest in our sensory stories; *Jasper's Beanstalk* and *Sam plants a Sunflower*, as well as exploration activities based on our assembly all about the *The Very Hungry Caterpillar*.

Many of the children have shown curiosity and interest in the changing weather. We have explored ice and its properties further, within our sensory play opportunities.

This half term the students have shown fantastic engagement with various communication strategies and have shown enthusiasm and willingness to participate in playful social interactions during our intensive interaction sessions.

Hedgehog Class

This term in Hedgehog class we have been learning about *changes*. We've been looking at the story *Jasper's Beanstalk* and enjoying taking part in the sensory story. We have also been exploring changes in the weather. We've starting singing the weather song during *morning hello* and looking at what the weather is like each day, as well as listening to different weather sounds in our phonics sessions.

We've also been working on developing our independence and self-care skills. We have been trying lots of new foods through sensology and food play sessions, and have been learning how to use cutlery to feed ourselves. We've practiced using spoons to mix together ingredients, and using knives to practice chopping up fruits and spread chocolate spread on toast!



Bluebell Class

We have had another great term in Bluebell Class. Our topic this term has been *Changes*. In Communication, Language and Literacy we have been looking at the story '*The Enormous Turnip*'. The children have really enjoyed the practical element of this story, with some of the children saying 'pull, pull, pull'. In cooking, we have been practising chopping vegetables, their favourite vegetable to chop was leeks! In Maths we have enjoyed exploring number and shape, space and measure through Bucket- the children are working towards Stage 4! The children have really enjoyed learning about capacity through water and food play. They have been working really hard on their 'use of tools' skills in Waldon. The children have really enjoyed having the speaker out during playtimes; dancing along to the music or listening closely to the vibrations from the speaker. In PE lessons, the children have been doing rebound, all the children love jumping around on the trampoline!



Primrose Class

This term in Primrose class we have enjoyed learning about *Changes*. We have been reading '*The Enormous Turnip*' and learning to use words such as 'pull' and 'help'. We have enjoyed continuing with our Waldon and workstation learning, exploring numbers and placement of objects in different ways.



We have also loved looking at different types of food play and exploring how it changes when different foods are added together. We have enjoyed making pizza dough, adding toppings as well as combining ketchup and cocoa powder to make a coloured paste!









We have loved going to other activities outside the classroom such as Immersive Theatre and swimming and have been developing our transition and listening skills.

We have been very busy this term but have had a great time!

Tulip Class

This half term in Tulip class we have done some great learning through our topic 'Changes'. In Understanding the World we learnt how an orange changes into juice! The children worked hard to squeeze the juice out and they loved drinking it!









In cooking we continued the theme of *changes* when making pizzas and looked at how the dough changed when cooked. The children used communication boards to choose their toppings.









This half term the children have really enjoyed their PE lessons. They have done fantastically well learning to sequence different jumps on the trampoline!







Daffodil Class

This term Daffodil Class have been learning about *Changes*. This has been a great topic, we have focused on changes that happen to plants and flowers as they grow and looking at the different types of weather. Another area that we have been looking at *Changes* is through food play. In our sessions, we have been looking at the different ways we can change food, through chopping / mashing, as well as adding sauces to rice to experience the colour and taste change. In Literacy, we have been working on developing our story telling skills by ordering the scenes and matching and exploring the characters, as well as developing our pencil control. Our Art focus this term has been using different vegetables to print and exploring how this can make our marks look different. We have also been developing our independence skills across the curriculum.



















Sunflower Class

This term we have enjoyed exploring our new topic of 'Changes' through our stories Jasper's Beanstalk and Sam Plants a Sunflower. We have explored props alongside the stories, and planted some beans ourselves. We've explored the life cycle of a bean through videos and sensory play activities, and have explored flowers and 'in the garden' sensory experiences through food play sessions. We are very excited to watch them grow!

In Maths we have continued to explore number and are learning the names of the numerals, engaging with number songs and counting with 1:1 correspondence, counting up to 3 and beyond. In cooking we have been making pizzas, focusing on cutting up different ingredients to use as toppings, and using a knife to cut vegetables to make a vegetable stir fry. The pupils have continued to make wonderful progress with their communication skills, starting to expand their use of communication boards across different activities, or using PECS increasingly independently.















Early Years Yoga with Rainbow ☐ Claire

This term we have had lots of creative fun with our bodies and minds in our winter □ celebrations. We enjoyed a winter yoga flow that started with snowball, moving to sled, to snow dog and finishing with snowman. So much fun.

Our favourite breathing technique this term has been 'blow the feather'. Take a deep breath in through the nose and blow the feather as hard as you can off your hand. How far can it go? We have all enjoyed the benefits of the relaxing flickering pillows during our meditation part of the lesson whilst lying in snake pose, great for our core, lower back and any digestion problems








































Daisy Class

Changing & Growing! Wow, this half term has flown by in Daisy class! With a focus on our new topic of *Changing and Growing*, everyone got so involved in our sensory story, *The Enormous Turnip*. We have pulled and pulled using a resistance band to mimic getting the turnip out of the ground, used 'call and response' to repeat key phrases in the story such as 'help', 'pull' and 'yum, yum'. We have listened carefully to farm animal noises in our phonics sessions and repeated the actions and Makaton signs in lots of farm based songs and nursery rhymes. Exploring the appearance and feel of different vegetables lead us to have a go at cutting them up for printing and mark making. Some of us even had a munch on courgettes, peppers and tomatoes during our circle times. In Attention Autism, we focussed on preparing pizza dough and looked at the changes after adding each ingredient. Then of course, we had to push and pull the dough to knead it. Moving outside, we decided to test our muscles by pushing and pulling the roundabout in the playground in a big Daisy class team effort and of course, there was lots of amazing movement in hydrotherapy as we practised our physio and swimming.















Key Stage 2

Oak Class

Our topic Wriggle and Crawl has lent itself to a focus on mini-beast based stories. As well as inspiring some great writing and communication we have been creative explorers - indoors and out! We were inspired by the antics of 'Superworm' by Julia Donaldson to build our own wormery and digging for worms to live in it. Our guests were only with us for a short time however and were released into the wild. When we moved onto, 'Arghh Spider' much to the relief of the adults in the room our pet spiders were of the furry toy variety. However we enjoyed being hunters with our magnifying glasses looking for our eight legged friends. All these stories have developed our PSHE and we have explored ideas about feelings and emotions, being kind to friends, looking after the environment and safety while we are out and about. Our final beastie is a bit less scary and the Bad Tempered ladybird by Eric Carle has inspired us to make red and black spotted Ladybird biscuits which tasted as sweet as they looked. We are extending our range of culinary delights each week in cooking and have made spidery pizzas and fruity faced toasts. We have recently started making trips to the Co-op on Woodlands Avenue to practice our shopping skills buying the ingredients for cooking. It is also an excellent opportunity to practice our road safety skills. As the weather warms up hopefully we will be able to get out into the community more and maybe into Woodley to make the most of the opportunities there. This week we have developed RE and knowledge about the world with a carousel of creative actives with our friends in KS2 based on Chinese New Year. We had beautiful weather for our trip to Taplow this week, everyone had a wonderful time running off lots of energy and it led to some great language and socialisation skills. Some of us even tried activities they hadn't tried before!













Pine Class

Pine class have had another busy term! We have been enjoying our new topic called *Hop*, Wiggle and Crawl! In Literacy, we have focused on a range of stories called 'Minibeasts, Arghh Spider and Super Worm'. We have enjoyed learning key features of different Minibeasts and learning about their habitats. We have enjoyed exploring our Sensory Garden to find different Minibeasts in their surroundings and we even made our very own wormery. Pine class thoroughly enjoy their Bucket sessions, where mostly the topic is incorporated, the children have enjoyed finding Minibeasts hidden in the mud! In Maths, we have focused on Weight, Capacity and Time. We have really enjoyed spending time with our friends in Explore Time too. In PSHE, we have been developing our independence skills as well as learning about Healthy Lifestyles. In RSE, we have been learning about our families; who they are and what they mean to us. In Cooking, we have been making Ladybird Pizzas, practicing key skills such as chopping, spreading and making independent choices; some pupils even experienced how to use an oven safely. This term, we also celebrated Chinese New Year where we made Lanterns, danced to Chinese music and explored some of the Chinese food culture using chopsticks. We also went to Taplow, we thoroughly enjoyed spending time in soft play, the sensory room and we even explored the outside! Lastly, we are very lucky to be having a very special visitor to Pine class every week, he has four legs, a fluffy tail and called Bailey ©

Willow Class

We have been having lots of fun learning with our new topic, "Hop, Wriggle and Crawl". We have focussed on mini-beasts this half term and will move onto things animals that hop and waddle after the holidays. "Superworm" has been a popular text and we all enjoyed stuffing long socks to make our own superworms! Willow class have been learning to brush their teeth effectively in PSHE and began to learn the rules of crossing a road safely. We explored the woods and looked for bugs, learning about their habitats. We have particularly enjoyed finding out more about spiders....I wonder if the children can tell you any spider facts at home?

We recently held a Key Stage 2 carousel of activities to celebrate and learn about Chinese New Year. The children enjoyed dragon dancing and making Chinese music along with tasting traditional Chinese food and some crafts. Willow class have been learning how to double amounts and divide by sharing equally...... a great test will be to see if they can share their pancakes fairly on Shrove Tuesday!

Welcome to our newsletter. We have had lots of fun with our new topic hop, wriggle and crawl this term. The children have enjoyed learning about different animal characteristics, from insects all the way through to fish. They have been able to sort them into mammal, amphibian, reptile, bird, fish and insect, then go on to label different animal parts, as well as understanding whether they are a herbivore, carnivore or omnivore. They have really impressed me at how many facts they have managed to remember and some of the children have been able to explain in detail how they are different too. We have used all this knowledge to sort animals in different ways, and practice our data handling skills to create charts and graphs. For our book the children have loved the story of Superworm, and we have seen some great acting and drama as we retell the story. They have created their own mind maps and written some fantastic sentences. For Chinese New year Key Stage 2 held a carousel of activities to celebrate and learn about all about it. There was dragon dancing, making Chinese music, tasting traditional Chinese food and some lovely craft making going on. 












Complex and Sensory Needs Department

Cherry Class

This half term we have been enjoying our Traditional Tales theme and our story focus has been the *Jolly Postman*. We have all engaged with posting different sensory letters into our post box and exploring the different fairy tale characters the postman meets along the way.

In assembly we have enjoyed some sensory versions of old stories, we tried porridge from *The Three Bears* and helped make bread for *The Little Red Hen*. Our Sensology session has been exploring the different senses when visiting a library.

We have continued to have hydrotherapy and our weekly highlight is our Yoga and Music therapy sessions with Karen and Claire!

Poppy Class

In Poppy class this half term we have been enjoying the *traditional tales* theme, we have liked the *Hansel and Gretel* story and created some lovely gingerbread house art using string and beads. We have been listening to lots of different stories each week and using different ways to show if we enjoyed them or talk about the story.

Rebound has been fun and we are all really anticipating when we are going to bounce. We continue to work hard on our targets and we have been going off on the yellow brick road for drama and music.

We have started some sensory cooking sessions each week and have made porridge and angel delight (with lots of exploration and mess!) some of us have also loved eating what we make!















Apple Class

We have had a very busy term in Apple Class. All students enjoyed listening a lot of stories as our topic this term has been 'Fairy tales'.

We have been working really hard in our phonics lessons and enjoyed sounding out the animals, musical instruments and making the body percussion sounds such as a clap or tap our knees.

Our *Write Dance* lessons have seen us concentrate hard on following the pattern using edible items such a breadsticks and custard.

We have been incredibly creative in our art lessons making a lot of little pigs using our feet and building a lot of houses using paper and twigs.

In early maths lessons we have been concentrating on counting the three little pigs and their houses and three chairs, three bowls of porridge, three beds, and the three title characters who live in the house for *Goldilocks and the Three Bears* story. It has been a busy term full of amazing achievements by all of the students and we look forward to seeing what the next term will bring.



Key Stage 3

Aspen Class

We have started our topic of 'Scrumdiddlyumptious' this term. We are learning all about making and reviewing chocolate, trying foods from around the world and cooking our own meals. In maths, we have been learning about number, shape and measure. We have been using our new skills to identify the shapes in nature and in the food that we eat, hexagons in Crunchie bars and cuboids in Quality Street! In maths, we are also focussing on measure and capacity to revisit our prior learning from last term. We have been measuring the weights of different items around the classroom and comparing weights of different foods. We have been discussing density, for example, why does a whole bag of spinach weigh the same as 25 raisins, even though they are smaller?



In literacy, we have been looking at *Charlie and The Chocolate Factory*. We have broken down the book into small bite size chunks and have been learning about what happens to all the characters throughout the story. We have been describing delicious chocolate bars, sumptuous sweeties and giant gobstoppers! In RHSE we are learning about puberty, and in science we are also looking at chemical reactions between elements. For PE we have been practising our trampolining and circuit skills. We have been walking to the Co-op to practice our communication, maths and safety skills. Also, we have been going to Camp Mohawk to make nature art! Finally, this term we have started swimming at Bulmershe and enjoy being independent whilst travelling over to the pool.

Cedar Class

In Cedar Class we had another lovely half term, full of fun activities and learning. This half term we have been looking into the story of 'Charlie and the Chocolate Factory' which quickly became one of our favourite stories! We absolutely loved tasting different kinds of chocolate and experimenting with different textures, for example observing how a bar of chocolate can melt into liquid when it gets warm. We also loved doing some role play and dressing up like one of the main characters, Willie Wonka!

This half term we also starting going swimming to Bulmershe Leisure Centre. We really enjoy going in the pool and we are making a lot of progress every week! In Maths we carried on learning about Number and we also compared different items according to their weight. We practised counting money and we had the chance to practise exchanging money by going to the local shop. We also talked about relationships and feelings and find ways to keep us regulated.




Chestnut Class

This term we have been reading Charlie and The Chocolate Factory in Literacy. The students are all enjoying listening to the story and are familiar with the different characters. We are just about to read the chapter about Augustus Gloop going up the chocolate factory pipe! We have a lovely display which includes lots of the students' artwork.

In Work-Related Learning the students continue with their weekly bike maintenance lessons. We have 2 trips coming up, to the Museum of Rural Life and our Try a Train Day. These have been organised by the Work-Related Learning staff at our school. In PSHE we have been learning how to do basic first aid, such as the Primary Survey, the recovery position and learning to make a call to 999 for an ambulance. In Maths we are studying numbers to 100. We have been playing Snakes and Ladders. We have also been weighing with scales and working on coin recognition.









Maple Class

'scrumdiddlyumptious' topic this term with 'Charlie and the Chocolate Factory'. We are working our way through the book exploring the characters, tasting chocolate as well as designing and making our own chocolate bars.









In maths, we focused on weight (heavy and light), money (coins and notes) and capacity full and empty, as well as looking at and using kilograms and grams and millilitres and litres.

In PSHE we have exploring how we feel and how others might feel. We have had 3 great trips to Camp Mohawk. The highlight of the half term was PE and trampolining. It has been great to see the confidence building over the half term.

This was brilliant as we has the museum to ourselves, and there was a whole range of activities, including handling some of the artefacts with special gloves and being able to see the resident chickens. It was a great place to go and I am hoping we can go back in the summer term.

This term we started swimming at Bulmershe Leisure Centre on a Friday afternoon which is a lovely end to the week. They are making great progress with their swimming.

The class have also been hugely motivated by using the trampoline in PE and changing tempo from slow to quick when playing instruments in Music. We look forward to continuing our topics after a well eared half term rest!













Holly Class

Holly class has had another busy and productive half term. The class have enjoyed our theme of Traditional tales where we have immersed the pupils in a range of stories through TAC PAC, Resonance board poems, themed cognition sessions and songs.

This half term we were lucky enough to have Make Sense Theatre back once a week. The pupils were pleased to have them back and each week we saw increased engagement and interactions. We can't wait for them come back in the summer term.

We have also begun a new life skill lesson where the pupils have been learning to fold clothes, peg clothes onto a washing line and hang clothes onto hangers with varying degrees of support. We will continue with these sessions after half term and build on these skills further.

In cooking we have been making oat biscuits where some pupils have following multi-step visual recipes and others have been tolerating touching and exploring unfamiliar ingredients.

This half term we have seen increased engagement with our pupils and we will be adding more whole class and personalized lessons into the class weekly timetable to continue to encourage this increased engagement, especially with group activities. The Holly team are extremely proud of the progress the class have made in all areas of our curriculum and with their personal targets.











Lime class

Regulation is still our priority. In Lime class the children try to find ways to regulate themselves all the time. Our trips to Thames Valley Adventure Playground and Camp Mohawk have helped them to explore different rooms, the outdoor area and engage with activities like Art.

Kite Class

Our Theme for the Spring Term is 'Fast Fashion'. The pupils have familiarised themselves with the local charity shops by completing exercises where they have had to find clothing for certain weathers, clothing made of specific materials or clothing to fit in with a certain theme in charity shops. The pupils have just started to design their own t-shirts based on the idea of upcycling a plain white t-shirt. Following on from our PHSE work about improving mental health by doing more things that make us happy, the pupils have thought about designs for printing a picture of something that makes them happy onto a t-shirt. Their ideas range from The Strictly Judges to Japanese writing to their favourite foods. This week we will have a practise run at printing pictures found on google images onto tshirts, tie dying t-shirts and using fabric pens to draw designs onto t-shirts before the pupils come up with their final designs and will upcycle their t-shirts before the Easter Holidays. We had a great day when the pupils and staff all came dressed in themed clothes. The themes were Camouflage, Party Party or Rainbow Bright. The pupils described their own and others clothes, guessed what themes each other had chosen and wrote about their outfits. The same day we went out for lunch at Cozze. The pupils had practised ordering several times in the classroom before we went. On the day all pupils ordered their own food either verbally or through pointing. We all enjoyed socialising and eating together and the pupils behaved impeccably. They were a credit to Addington.

In our weekly Kitchen Skills sessions we are now preparing and cooking our own lunch. The idea is that we have chosen a lunch that the pupils may be able to prepare for themselves in the future (rather than a fancy meal with lots of ingredients). This half term we are making pasta and sauce with grated cheese and cut up fruit and cake for dessert. By making the same meal every week the pupils are becoming more efficient week by week at the skills needed.


P.E. this half term has been rebound therapy – trampolining, which seems to be very popular amongst the pupils. In our weekly trips to Ridgeline, a therapeutic garden, the highlight this half term seems to have been learning about the layers in a compost heap and making their own mini layered compost 'heaps' within a plastic bottle which they are watching slowly biodegrade over time. We continue to have a huge focus on crossing roads safely, paying for items in shops and we still somehow manage to fit in Phonics and individual reading two or three times a week.

Careers Fair - On Thursday 25th January, Students went to the Woodley Job fair. Students had prepared some questions and were able to talk to employers about different career






opportunities they had available.

Life Skills - In cooking this term students have chosen some of their favourite dishes and have been making their own two-course lunch. Robin Class

The highlight of our half term in Robin class has been a visit to Pizza Express for a work ready day! We learnt all about working in a pizzeria from Marco and Dave who guided us through the process of making and shaping the base, adding the toppings and cooking the pizza. We learnt that sometimes things happen at work that you don't like, such as dropping something, getting too hot, or having to wear a uniform you wouldn't usually choose to wear, but that it is all part of having a job! We also learnt that having a job can be great fun; meeting new people, making food you like and enjoying the feeling of making others happy. Pizza Express were fantastic hosts and also accommodated our very complex allergies, intolerances and preferences!



Horticulture

This half term the horticulture department students have been learning about what things are able to grow in the winter months, They sowed seeds from a salad tomato and placed them in a propeergator where the seeds have grown into small tomato plants and will now keep these indoors until the weather improves. We also planted out some garlic and looked at the difference between tender and hardy plants.

There is lots of spring prepping underway and we are working on our Newbury challenge projects also.



Hospitality

This half term the Hospitality students have been working hard toward their City & Guilds qualification, with all 6 students successfully completing their Customer Service and Introduction to Hospitality units.

We have been keeping staff fed with the KORE café every week, experimenting with recipes the students have found online for different cakes and bakes. We have also been looking into different techniques when baking and practising these to expand our kitchen skills.

In line with the 6th form project we have been upcycling scraps of fabric by stitching them together to make larger pieces. These will be used to make new items and cutting emblems for t-shirts and bags to personalise them and make them funky. Kestrel class have finished their project where they learnt to make stencils and then screen print them before ironing to set the fabric dye.

Once again over this half term, our young people have enjoyed a number of activities in the wider community to develop their social, leisure, independence and life skills. Some of the highlights have been doing work experience in school and in the wider community. Students have enjoyed attending and getting a flavour of college life, doing the links courses at either Reading College or Bracknell and Wokingham College. To access lifelong leisure and sporting activities, some of our young people have enjoyed weekly swimming sessions at the Bulmershe Leisure Centre on Mondays; and badminton at the Woodford Park Leisure Centre or used the Gym at the Bulmershe Leisure Centre, on Thursdays.

While some students are pursuing a City and Guilds in Horticulture each week, others have continued to enjoy visiting The Ridgeline Trust to learn about and have a sensory experience in gardening.

With our project this term being Fast Fashion our young people have been focussing on looking at fashions down the ages and designing different items of clothing. They have also enjoyed making picture frames and doing applique work during weekly Business Enterprise sessions. During hands on and work experience sessions students learn about the importance of Health and safety and team work in the work place. Focus has also been on town and travel training.

After a busy half term, a well-deserved break is looked forward to when each one of us can recharge our batteries in readiness for another rather busy and activity filled half term ahead.




The Creative Arts Page

This term, the whole school are following same theme in their creative arts lessons as we work towards our whole school production of 'The Wizard of Oz'.

Drama

Classes have been learning about the story of 'The Wizard of Oz' through an introduction assembly with Sean and Carla. They were introduced to the main characters, songs and key moments of the story. In their drama sessions, classes have been focussing on specific scenes in relation to the production. Rehearsals have begun with the lead characters too.





In immersive theatre, students have been developing sensory awareness through experiencing a wide range of sensory props, storytelling, music and sound. We explore the 8 senses through our sessions as we travel to the Land of Oz.

- Vision we have a Lion shadow screen.
- Hearing music from 'The Wizard of Oz' including singing "Follow the Yellow Brick Road/We're Off to See the Wizard" and using a microphone with high reverb to make sounds.
- Smell/Taste Tea (to represent oil for the Tin man)
- Touch Toto (dog teddy), slime (cornflour and water), yellow textured mats, wool (to represent
- Vestibular use of parachute (to represent hot air balloon)
- Proprioception Tornado use of fans
- Interoception notice and acknowledge students reactions how they might be feeling.

Music

All students have been journeying to the Land of Oz, to coincide with our preparations for the production in April. Early Years have been exploring different rhythms and tempos using the resonance board and learning to identify different sounds and/or how instruments are played, for example, shake or tap a tambourine.



Sensory sessions have explored low and high pitch notes while singing 'Over the Rainbow', with pupils taking turns to play these different pitches. The pupils have worked on their anticipation skills and awareness of song structure in 'Ding, Dong', changing our playing on

a set of a bells between a set rhythm and a fast ring, like an alarm clock! For the song 'The Merry Old Land of Oz' we have focused on our vocalisation and interaction skills.

The other key stages have been exploring octaves with the song 'Over the Rainbow', which famously starts with an octave jump in the melody. Pupils have been singing the song, and learning to play it on xylophones or keyboards. After this, some pupils travelled through the ages, listening to multiple different cover versions from across the decades, learning about covers and having a go at playing some of the different instruments contained within some of the covers. These included ukulele (Israel Kamakawiwoʻole), acoustic guitar (Eva Cassidy), electric guitar, bass and drum kit (Me First and the Gimme Gimme's). After exploring these different versions, the pupils created their own cover versions. Some students have explored rhythm reading and playing with claves and drums for the song 'Yellow Brick Road', with pupils taking it in turns to lead each other through tempo changes.

<u>Art</u>

Students have been making props for different scenes in the show. Poppies, sweetcorn, apples and the Emerald City gates are some of the props made so far.
